

A Prayer and Texas Millionaires A Letter to the Editor By Debbie Hummel

December 4, 2003

Dear Editor:

Two of my favorite things about Christmas are finding just the right

present for the special people in my life and creating a great Christmas memory with those special people.

I remember a few times I got the gift for my son just right. Christmas he got a Cocker Spaniel puppy. He was so proud; he had his own dog. We never did teach it to stay in the yard. That dog could jump a fence better than any high jumper I have ever seen. The dog was black and white, but my son insisted that he be named Copper because he so loved The Fox and the Hound. Then one year I thought I would be real smart, and I ordered something he said he wanted for Christmas in Only to read his list in August. November after <u>Star Wars</u> came out and learn the Millennium Falcon was what was The return was easy but on his list. finding the Millennium Falcon turned out to be a Christmas miracle in and of itself. He still has it in the chest of growing up things. Then one year I finally gave in and bought a television for his room. Now he was in control of his spare time. This gift may very well have saved either his or his sister's life because if they hadn't quit arguing over what channel was being watched, I was going to end up killing one of them.

As far as special memories, I know Grandmother's homemade candy has always been special. I don't know how he can eat so many of those homemade Texas Millionaires and never get sick. Even at 26 they are still a favorite and he still eats every piece she will make for him. It must be one of those Christmas miracles. He also enjoyed, up until about 13, driving all around town looking at Christmas lights and singing carols in our own special key. I think he enjoyed it even after 13 but could never have admitted it. Then there was always being in the Church Christmas play. Somehow I

doubt that he really enjoyed those shepherd costumes that much, but they are part of my favorite memories.

This year I am having real trouble even thinking of a gift for him. Part of the problem is that he is 26 but the biggest problem is what do you send to make it Christmas in Iraq? My son is serving with the 4th Infantry and is currently somewhere in the vicinity of Samarra. My daughter says I am just feeling sorry for myself, that my son signed up to be in the Army and that he was ready to go to Iraq. She is right; I am feeling a little pitiful. He did voluntarily join the Army, and he was ready to do in his words, "What I have been trained to do."

This isn't his first Christmas overseas. In fact he has had two in South Korea. Somehow those Christmases were different. I didn't feel so detached those Christmases. He could call as often as either one of us could pay for the calls. I could send any gift I wanted and know it could be in the stuff he would ship home after his tour. Iraq is different. Although we hear from him every couple of weeks, the time he can talk is shorter and what is going on is very different. As far as a gift what do you send to the desert? He can't move much more than his issued gear from place to place and no one knows what he will be allowed to bring home.

We did send a couple hand held games, some toiletries, and a bunch of snack stuff. The same snack stuff we have been sending for months just more. And of course Grandmother did send a big box of homemade Texas Millionaires. But will he really feel like

it is Christmas? Will that let him know how much we love him? How much he is missed and how proud we are to call him Son, Husband, Grandson, Brother and our special soldier?

I write this for two reasons. One, it has been very therapeutic, but the main reason is in hopes that everyone who reads it will truly enjoy their sons and daughters this Christmas. Buy them a gift that is special just to them. Create a special Christmas memory. Laugh with them. Share traditions with them. Love them in each and every way you can. Do this because in a few years from this Christmas they may be in a country filled with shepherds but no Christmas Play and where the lights that flash in the night are dangerous, not pretty. They may be in a place that is filled with planes and big machines with guns that were never meant as toys and have nothing to do with the fiction in movies. A place where they are fighting but not with their sister and there is a real risk of being killed. In a place where their best friend isn't a dog but another soldier watching their back. A place where the only things that look or feel like Christmas are wonderful memories from Christmases past, a word of love from home and a box filled with Grandmother's homemade Texas Millionaires.
